Hey everybody, Jay Pathak here, and this is my last hundred-day update for the year. And what a year it has been with the election and all the different changes in our country and, if you're a pastor or you're a leader, it's been a challenging set of things to navigate. And just even in the Vineyard, we've had such an exciting year. You know, most of us have been through our Regional Conferences, there's a couple out there still. And, man, we've gotten to talk about what we've been doing over the last year and what we're looking forward to in this upcoming year. And so, yeah, it's been an amazing year.
